Analytics Frontiers is the UNC Charlotte Data Science Initiative's annual conference, with support from prominent corporations and institutions in financial services, healthcare, energy, retail, education, government and manufacturing. In its fourth year, the Analytics Frontiers Conference will bring together business executives, thought leaders, data scientists, entrepreneurs, professional analysts and a diverse set of speakers. Last year, the keynote speaker was Nate Silver, founder of FiveThirtyEight.com and author of The Signal and The Noise. DSI is in the process of selecting another impressive keynote and additional speakers for this distinguished event and invites submissions from UNC Charlotte personnel. Presentations should be deliverable within a 45-minute time slot (including any Q&A, as appropriate). To submit your presentation for consideration, please send it to analyticsfrontiers@uncc.edu no later than 1. If your topic is selected, you will be contacted to submit a brief bio and picture, as well as to sign a speaker's agreement, including authorizing of the UNC Charlotte Data Science Initiative to make presentations available for viewing online.

Analytics Frontiers 2018 will be held on March 21 at The Ritz-Carlton in uptown Charlotte. It will be a full day event, with a focus on deep learning, machine learning, and artificial intelligence and breakout sessions that cut across a number of industries. Examples of suitable topics include: demos or case studies or discussions about the successful implementations of processes, tools, and infrastructure required to support large scale analytics; emerging technologies in data analytics; challenges in analytics within a specific industry; organizational acceptance of analytics; ethical considerations in data analytics; and analytics applications for everyday business. "Middle East Meltdown: Causes and Consequences" with Ryan Crocker Ryan Crocker is a Diplomat in Residence at the Woodrow Wilson School, Princeton University, for the academic year 2017-2018. He served as U.S ambassador to Afghanistan, Iraq, Pakistan, Syria, Kuwait, and Lebanon. Ambassador Croker has received various awards and recognition, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, in 2009 for his extensive career and work in both foreign relations and policy.

In September 2004, President Bush conferred on him the personal rank of Career Ambassador, the highest in the Foreign Service. In May 2009, Secretary of the State Hilary Clinton announced the establishment of Ryan C. Crocker Award for Outstanding Achievement in Expeditionary Diplomacy. Crocker will summarize what he has found to be the causes and consequences of the Middle East Meltdown.

"U.S. - Canada Relations and NAFTA" with Honorable Andrew

Honorable Andrew Leslie, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Foreign Affairs (Canada), has enjoyed a decorated 35-year career with the Canadian Armed Forces including a variety of command and staff positions in numerous overseas postings with the UN and NATO. In addition, Mr. Leslie has served on international missions including leading troops in Germany, Cyprus, the former Yugoslavia, and, most recently, Afghanistan.

Mr. Leslie's distinguished service has been recognized both nationally and internationally with appointments as Commander of the Order of Military Merit in 2005, Commander of the U.S. Legion of Merit in 2007, awarded the Meritorious Service Cross Award and the Commander's Cross of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Poland in 2010.

"US National Security Challenges and Opportunities: a Conversation" with Former CIA Director John Brennan"

Former CIA Director John O. Brennan is currently a Distinguished Fellow for Global Security at the Center on National Security at Fordham Law School, a Distinguished Non-Resident Scholar at the University of Texas at Austin, and a senior Advisor at Kissinger Associates Incorporated. Mr. Brennan served as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) in 2013-2017, advising President Obama on counterterrorism strategies, helped coordinate the U.S. Government's approach to homeland security, including its policies for responding to terrorism, cyber-attacks, natural disasters, and pandemics. At the CIA, Mr. Brennan specialized in Middle Eastern affairs and counterterrorism,

leading a multi-agency effort to establish what would later become the National Counterterrorism Center.
